Launch of 2018 RSA Morton Award for Lens-based Media Artists in Scotland

Fund ID: S41346

The Royal Scottish Academy (RSA) Morton Award offers a monetary award to artists working in lens-based media in Scotland, in order to support them to research, develop and produce a new body of work in a lens-based medium.

The winner will be presented with an award of £5,000.

The winner will also receive the chance to stage an exhibition of their completed work at the RSA Annual Exhibition in 2019, and will have their work acquired into the RSA Permanent Collections.

The scheme is open to artists working in a lens-based media (including digital and analogue photography, film and video). Artists must have been born in Scotland or have studied at a Scottish art school or have been resident in Scotland for at least three years.

The deadline for applications is Monday 2 July 2018.

Collider GB 2018 Offers Equity Funding for UK Marketing and Adtech Firms - Deadline Imminent

Collider is London's leading marketing and adtech (or MadTech) accelerator. The programme offers start-ups up equity funding through a mentorship driven programme. Collider also partners with global brands and agencies that are looking to work directly with start-ups.

The programme fuses ambitious founders with progressive brands and specialist investors. It injects smart capital, expert coaching and forges commercial connections. Through productive collaboration, it fosters the fastest route to product-market fit, follow-on funding, competitive edge and revenue.

The six-month programme is split into mentoring, workshops and one-to-one coaching, giving participants the tools and knowledge needed to accelerate the growth of their business.

The following package is on offer:

- **Cash:** Two levels of investment – £35,000 net (£50,000 in total for 10-12% equity) for early stage companies, and £70,000 net (£100,000 in total for 10-12% equity) for later stage companies (with some proof of value with commercial traction or prior fundraising). Investment comes directly from angels with industry specific experience.
- **Coaching:** A six-month programme running two days a month and lifetime support to help scale with speed.
- **Connections:** Meet the leaders in this industry, including the most relevant, senior team members from well-regarded corporates.
- **Community:** Start-ups, scale-ups, corporates, investors and mentors become part of the participants' community.

UK start-ups that provide tools to help brands and agencies better find, understand, engage and sell to consumers may apply. In short: Marketing and Advertising technology businesses – MadTech.

The deadline for receipt of applications is 30 April 2018.

The programme takes place between 2 July 2018 and 17 January 2019.

£10,000 F Factor Competition for Tech Savvy Young Entrepreneurs - 2018 Round Open

Fund ID: S41478

The F Factor Competition was set up to celebrate ten years of the Founders Forum. Through a pitching event taking place in the summer, the contest awards funding for exceptional ideas for apps, games or technology businesses. The aim is to empower young people who might not otherwise have access to inspirational investors or world-class technology experts.

Entrants do not require a business plan or any relevant experience. The finalists must be available to attend Founders Forum in London on 14 June 2018. They will also be required to attend a workshop day prior to the event where they will receive expert help in pitching their idea.

One individual or team will receive a cash prize of £10,000. As well as the cash prize, the five finalists will get the chance to meet and pitch to some of the best tech investors in the world - so more than one business may end up being created from the competition. All ideas will remain the property of the entrant.

The money can be used by the winner to launch their company; however, it is entirely up to the winner how they spend the money. For

example, they may wish to use it to develop an idea, or perhaps invest it in infrastructure such as a new computer set up, for example, or undertake a research trip abroad.

Individuals or teams of up to two young people can pitch an idea for a tech business based on an app, mobile technology, gaming, computing or internet-based retail.

Entrants must be aged between 14 and 25 (inclusive). Entrants will not be judged on their CV or what they have achieved in the past. They just need to have the start of a business idea for apps, games or technology businesses. Entrants might be still at school or university in the UK.

Entries can be submitted until Friday 25 May 2018.

Hilden Charitable Fund - Summer Play Schemes Grant

Each year, the Hilden Charitable Fund sets aside a small budget for the Summer Play Scheme.

Grants of between £500 and £1,500 are available to fund summer play schemes for children living in disadvantaged communities.

The Fund will support the following:

- Summer play schemes for children aged five to 18 years.
- Local schemes lasting for two to six weeks.
- Schemes with strong volunteer support.

Some priority will be given to projects that show they are inclusive of children from refugee families and show involvement of Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) groups.

Applications are invited from voluntary agencies in the UK with an income of less than £150,000.

The next deadline for applications is 1 June 2018.

Scottish Government's Vote Centenary Small Grant Scheme Opens for Applications

The Scottish Government's Vote Centenary Small Grant Scheme is making £170,000 available in small grants to celebrate and commemorate the passing of the Representation of the People Act 1918 and to look forward to the future and how to best support women's political participation here and now.

Commenting on the launch of the new fund, Equalities Secretary Angela Constance said:

"We have come a long way since some women secured the right to vote 100 hundred years ago, yet much still needs to be done to eradicate gender inequality and create a fairer, safer and more equal society.

"The Vote Centenary Small Grant Scheme is now open for applications. We are asking local communities to think of creative ways in which they can mark the centenary and I would encourage those that can to apply to the scheme as soon as possible.

"This funding will ensure we pay tribute to the women who fought so hard for the rights that women have today, as well as playing an important part in encouraging the next generation of women leaders."

Grants of between £500 and £5000 are available for activities taking place in Scotland that celebrate and increase people's awareness of the women's suffrage movement. The activity should be either one-off or for a time limited period only, and must take place between 1 June 2018 and 8 March 2019 (International Women's Day).

There is particular interest in supporting activity which will involve women from under-represented groups such as minority ethnic, LGBT+ and disabled women.

Voluntary and community organisations, local authorities and individuals can apply.

The deadline for applications is 11 May 2018 (5pm).

Big Lottery Fund Relaunches Reaching Communities England

Fund ID: S18288

The Big Lottery Fund is seeking ideas for projects that will improve communities across England and will make grants of more than £10,000 available to support organisations that want to take action on the issues that matter to people and communities.

The funding can support project activities, operating costs, organisational development and capital costs and can support work for up to five years.

To be eligible, groups need to show how their ideas meet the following three priorities:

- Bring people together and build strong relationships in and across communities.
- Improve the places and spaces that matter to communities.
- Enable more people to fulfil their potential by working to address issues at the earliest possible stage.

Organisations that are interested in applying will need to have an initial discussion with the Big Lottery Fund about their proposed idea. If the idea is accepted, the Big Lottery Fund panel of staff will then invite a full proposal.

This is a rolling programme with no deadlines.

£3.3 Million Volunteering Support Grant Fund is Open for Applications

Fund ID: S39099

Administered by the Voluntary Action Fund (VAF), the Volunteering Support Grant Fund is provided by the Scottish Government, which has committed a total of £3.3 million over the funding period 1 July 2018 to 31 March 2021 to improve support for volunteers in Scotland.

Grants of between £7,500 and £10,000 per year are available for small- to medium-sized voluntary organisations or community groups in Scotland, to support – both new and the extension/expansion of existing – projects to recruit and train additional volunteers and to improve how current and new volunteers are supported in their role (ie by contributing towards costs such as volunteers' expenses, establishing robust volunteering policies and procedures, uniforms/equipment, or volunteer thank-you events).

Applicants are expected to recruit at least 15 new volunteers as part of the funded project, 10 of whom are from identified groups of people who may experience disadvantage or might have traditionally encountered barriers to volunteering.

By the end of the grant period, organisations should have made specific and sustainable improvements to the way they recruit, involve and support volunteers, and projects should have contributed towards the scheme's overall outcomes, which are:

- Increasing the diversity of the third sector's volunteer pool, especially to include people who experience disadvantage or would traditionally experience barriers to volunteering.
- Improving opportunities for skills and personal development through volunteering.
- Improving the third sector's capacity to support, train and deploy volunteers.
- Enhancing the services that organisations deliver to better meet the needs of the communities they serve.

Funded activities should take place between 1 July 2018 and 31 March 2021.

The deadline for applications is 4 May 2018 (5pm).

Stop Loan Sharks Community Funding Available for 2018

The England Illegal Money Lending Team (IMLT) was set up in 2004. Initially created as a pilot scheme in Birmingham to investigate loan sharks it had such an impact on illegal money lending it received further Government funding. The IMLT work as Stop Loan Sharks within local communities, within education, and with partner agencies, such as the police, housing associations and debt advice services. In the last 14 years, the team has supported more than 25,000 people and written off over £63.5 million of debt in England alone. The IMLT also works in Wales and Scotland.

For a third year in a row, the England Illegal Money Lending Team is offering grants of up to £5,000 for charities, community and voluntary groups, schools, statutory agencies and local residents in England.

The funding can be spent on any worthwhile community project that meets the following criteria:

- Contributes to raising the awareness of the dangers of using loan sharks.
- Prevents crime and disorder and publicises the Stop Loan Sharks message.
- Promotes the work of the Illegal Money Lending Team (IMLT) in communities.
- Encourages reporting of loan sharks.

There is particular interest in projects and initiatives that are different from the rest and will leave a legacy in the communities they are delivered in.

Projects must address four aims: innovative, community engagement, impact and legacy.

The deadline for applications is 30 June 2018.

New Funding for Research and Industry to Develop Smart Energy Systems through IUK Competitions ****NEW****

Around 80% of global energy use still comes from fossil fuels. This will need to change rapidly in order to preserve a safe and stable climate. Countries all over the world are moving to renewable energy, with investment more than doubling over the last decade. However, for the majority of energy to be clean and affordable, more intelligent systems are now needed.

Smart systems can link energy supply, storage and use, and join up utilities and infrastructure to dramatically increase efficiency. By developing these world-leading systems in the UK, it will be possible to reduce bills while creating high-value jobs for the future.

Addressing the identified need for new energy systems, the upcoming Energy Revolution Challenge is being provided by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI) through Innovate UK (IUK) and the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC). It is part of the government's [Industrial Strategy Challenge Fund](#).

The Challenge is a fund for research and industry to develop future smart energy systems and prove their use at scale. It will bring together academia with industry to develop and demonstrate new approaches to provide cleaner, cheaper energy. This includes linking low-carbon power, heating and transport systems with energy storage and advanced IT to create intelligent, local energy systems and services.

The programme will launch with two initial competitions for funding. The first opportunities will make up to £41.5 million available for:

- ground-breaking, localised energy system demonstrators; and
- projects that develop novel concepts that could revolutionise local energy provision.

Applications from research and industry partners in the UK will be accepted. IUK will be looking to fund projects across the UK.

Full details of the competitions will be announced shortly. Those wishing to find out more in the meantime can attend one of the briefing events, taking place across the UK in April and May: Cardiff on 18 April, Belfast on 25 April, Glasgow on 26 April, Leeds on 9 May and London on 15 May.

Biffa Award's New Partnership Grants Scheme Open for England and NI ****NEW****

Fund ID: S43766

Under the Partnership Grants programme, Biffa Award is making large grants of between £250,000 and £750,000 available for new not-for-profit projects that will improve a built or natural environment. The projects must be of regional or national significance and located within 15 miles of a significant Biffa Group Limited operation or active Biffa Landfill site in England or Northern Ireland.

To be eligible for the funding, projects must address one of the following themes:

- The Built Environment theme aims to restore, modernise and improve facilities such as cultural, heritage or visitor centres.
- The Natural Environment theme aims to restore or improve the natural environment; land purchase may be considered in some circumstances. Projects must be working to Biodiversity 2020: A strategy for England's Wildlife and ecosystem services Section 3; its successor, as agreed in the 25 year plan; or a Local Biodiversity Action Plan target.

Preference will be given to projects:

- Where Biffa Award is the majority funder.
- That work in partnership with other organisations.
- That engage with people through improving their knowledge of the asset.

The grants are to be used for site-based improvement work, and the majority of costs should be direct capital delivery work. Projects should be in a position to start work as soon as possible, once a formal offer agreement has been issued.

Expressions of interest can be made at any time.

Rosa Invites Women's Groups to Apply for a 'Voices from the Front Line' Grant

This is the third year that Rosa, a registered charity, is providing its 'Voices from the Front Line' grants programme which offers funding to support charitable advocacy work across Rosa's four pillars of leadership and representation, safety, health and economic justice.

Rosa 'resources advocacy, campaigning and activists with lived experience of injustice and inequality – giving voice especially to women facing intersecting disadvantages including race, class, sexuality, disability, poverty or migration status.'

This year, grants of between £500 and £3,000 (an increase from the maximum of £2,000 last year) are being made available to women's sector voluntary and community organisations in the UK to pay for increasing the skills, capacity, credibility and effectiveness of women who wish to challenge gender inequality and promote awareness and change.

Grants will be awarded for projects that:

- Stimulate debate and amplify women's voices.
- Raise awareness of one or more of Rosa's four pillars.
- Influence the public, policy makers, media and/or government.
- Change behaviours, attitudes or policies.

Examples of work that will be supported include:

- Travel costs for a service user to speak at an event or national conference.
- Presentation, media or lobbying training to support organisational advocacy strategies.
- Costs of creating campaign materials, such as posters, infographics or videos.
- Articulating the story of one woman to champion an organisation's work.
- Making a case to local commissioners for the value of the group's service.
- Meeting costs with local/national government representatives or for planning a campaign.

Creative approaches are encouraged. There is particular interest in hearing from 'new voices to stand up and take action'.

The deadline for applications is 29 May 2018 (5pm).

Research and Development

New Calls Launch under Horizon 2020 Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions

Fund ID: S39690

Horizon 2020 is the EU's programme for research and innovation, running from 2014-2020 and is the successor to the Seventh Framework Programme (FP7). Two Call Topics – Individual Fellowships and co-funding of regional, national and international programmes - have launched under Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions (MCSA), which are part of the Excellent Science pillar of Horizon 2020.

A further Call Topic – Widening Fellowships - has launched under the Spreading Excellence and Widening Participation pillar of Horizon 2020, which is designed to support research activities intended to address the internal disparities which persist across the EU. These Fellowships compliment the Individual Fellowships of the MCSA Excellent Science pillar.

Details of the three Call Topics are as follows:

Individual Fellowships

The goal of the Individual Fellowships is to enhance the creative and innovative potential of experienced researchers, wishing to diversify their individual competence in terms of skill acquisition through advanced training, international and intersectoral mobility. Individual Fellowships provide opportunities to researchers of any nationality to acquire and transfer new knowledge and to work on research and innovation in Europe and beyond. Only one proposal per individual researcher per call will be evaluated.

Fellowships take the form of European Fellowships or Global Fellowships. European Fellowships are held in EU Member States or Horizon 2020 Associated Countries and are open to researchers either coming to Europe from any country in the world or moving within Europe. The researcher must comply with the rules of mobility in the country where the European Fellowship is held.

Total funding levels vary according to the type of Fellowship being pursued, and are as follows:

- MSCA-IF-EF-CAR Career Restart panel, MSCA-IF-EF-RI Reintegration panel, MSCA-IF-EF-ST Standard European Fellowships: €220 million.
- MSCA-IF-EF-SE Society and Enterprise panel: €8 million.
- MSCA-IF-GF Global Fellowships: €45 million.

Widening Fellowships

These Fellowships are based on the principle of mobility, and researchers can receive funding on the condition that they move from one country to another to acquire new knowledge. Widening Fellowships will provide an opportunity to researchers of any nationality to acquire and transfer new knowledge and to work on research and innovation in Widening countries. The Widening Countries are as follows:

Member States: Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia.

Associated Countries (subject to valid association agreements of third countries with Horizon 2020): Albania, Armenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Faroe Islands, Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Georgia, Moldova, Montenegro, Serbia, Tunisia, Turkey and Ukraine.

Support is available for individual, trans-national fellowships awarded to researchers of any nationality, in Widening countries. The proposals submitted under the Widening Fellowships must fulfil all the admissibility and eligibility conditions of the Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions Individual Fellowships and pass all the thresholds for that call.

The total budget available for the Widening Fellowships is €6 million.

Co-funding of regional, national and international programmes

The COFUND scheme aims to stimulate regional, national or international programmes to foster excellence in researchers' training, mobility and career development, spreading the best practices of the Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions. This will be achieved by co-funding new or existing regional, national, and international programmes to open up to, and provide for, international, intersectoral and interdisciplinary research training, as well as transnational and cross-sectoral mobility of researchers at all stages of their career.

Each proposal funded under the COFUND scheme must have a sole beneficiary that will be responsible for the availability of the necessary complementary funds to execute the proposal. Researchers supported under this scheme shall comply with the mobility rules of the Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions. Proposed programmes are encouraged to cover all research disciplines, but can also focus on specific disciplines.

COFUND takes the form of:

- Doctoral programmes (total funding €30 million) - addressing the development and broadening of the research competencies of early-stage researchers. Each researcher must be enrolled in a doctoral programme.
- Fellowship programmes (total funding €50 million) - funding individual research training and career development fellowships for experienced researchers. Given that the aim of the co-funded fellowship programmes is the support of individual fellows, research teams will not be funded.

The deadline for applications to the Individual and Widening Fellowships is 12 September 2018.

The deadline for applications for the co-funding of regional, national and international programmes is 27 September 2018.

Horizon 2020 - Bio-Based Industries Joint Undertaking (BBI JU) 2018 Call Now Open

The objective of the Bio-Based Industries Joint Undertaking (BBI JU) is to implement a programme of research and innovation activities in Europe that will assess the availability of renewable biological resources that can be used for the production of bio-based materials, and on that basis support the establishment of sustainable bio-based value chains.

This is the fifth of seven Calls being launched between 2014 and 2020 and has a budget of €115 million. The Call has the following strategic orientations:

- Fostering a sustainable biomass-feedstock supply to feed both existing and new value chains.
- Optimising efficient processing for integrated biorefineries.
- Developing innovative bio-based products for specific market applications.
- Creating and accelerating the market uptake of bio-based products and applications.

The topics are as follows:

Research and Innovation Actions

- BBI.2018.SO1.R1– Resolve logistical, infrastructural and technological challenges to valorise residual and side streams from aquaculture, fisheries and the aquatic biomass processing industries.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R2– Develop techniques and systems to improve the performance of biocatalysts.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R3 – Introduce new technologies to make pulping operations more resource-efficient.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R4 – Apply advanced biotechnologies to convert biomass that contains inhibitors into high value-added chemicals and materials.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R5 – Develop innovative single-step processes for conversion of a biomass feedstock into multiple readily usable intermediate streams.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R6 – Apply emerging breakthrough technologies to improve existing value chains.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R7 – Electrochemical processes for bio-based monomers and polymers.
- BBI.2018.SO2.R8 – Develop adequate computational systems for modelling the design, start-up, scaling-up and continuous improvement of bioprocesses involving microorganisms.
- BBI.2018.SO3.R9 - Develop functional molecules for bio-based coatings outperforming existing products and meeting market requirements.
- BBI.2018.SO3.R10 - Develop bio-based packaging products that are biodegradable/ compostable and/or recyclable.
- BBI.2018.SO3.R11 - Develop technologies and systems to produce bio-based aromatics that outperform fossil-based counterparts.

Innovation Actions - Demonstration

- BBI.2018.SO1.D1– Improve the logistical and pre-processing steps of locally sourced biomass to serve as feedstock for the bio-based industry.
- BBI.2018.SO1.D2– Find solutions to dilution, pollution and content diversity challenges to turn mixed urban bio-waste (1) into sustainable feedstock for the bio-based industry.
- BBI.2018.SO2.D3 – Valorise sugars from the cellulosic and/or hemicellulosic fractions of lignocellulosic biomass.

- BBI.2018.S03.D4 – Produce biopesticides or bio-based fertilisers as components of sustainable agricultural management plans (1).
- BBI.2018.S03.D5 – Produce sustainable and cost-efficient high-performance functional ingredients from alternative sources.

Flagship Innovation Actions

- BBI.2018.S03.F1 – Produce on a large scale competitive bio-based building blocks, polymers and materials that outperform existing alternatives in identified market applications.
- BBI.2018.S03.F2 – Large-scale production of proteins for food and feed applications from alternative, sustainable sources.

Coordination and Support Actions

- BBI.2018.S04.S1 – Benefit from previous and current work to create a coherent and stimulating 'environment' for a sustainable bio-based industry in Europe.
- BBI.2018.S04.S2 – Expand the bio-based industry across Europe.
- BBI.2018.S04.S3 – Identify opportunities to promote careers, education and research activities in the European bio-based industry.

Activities should be carried out through collaboration between stakeholders along the entire bio-based value chains, including primary production and processing industries, consumer brands, SMEs, research and technology centres and universities.

The deadline for submission of proposals is 6 September 2018.

Research England Launches £75m Expanding Excellence in England Fund

Fund ID: S43763

The Expanding Excellence in England (E3) fund aims to support the strategic expansion of excellent research units and departments in higher education institutes (HEIs) across England.

The aims of the fund are to:

- Strengthen the contribution of English HEIs to our society, pushing the frontiers of human knowledge, delivering economic impact and creating social impact by supporting our society and others to become enriched, healthier, more resilient and sustainable
- Build the capacity and quality of research in departments and units within English universities where excellence exists but at a small scale with potential for growth
- Contribute towards the delivery of government strategy, including the Industrial Strategy, the GCRF strategy and local priorities by supporting sustained improvements in research capacity across England while maintaining the principle of funding excellence wherever it is found
- Enhance the skills base and build talent in areas of research excellence where there is untapped potential
- Stimulate strategic partnerships between HEIs and other organisations outside of Higher Education.

In order to expand excellence, E3 focusses only on units and departments where there is demonstrable research excellence already, but limited scale of activity.

Bids will need to set out how they align with national policy, in particular the UK Industrial Strategy or the Global Challenges Research Fund (GCRF) strategy, or how they fit with local strategic priorities. This might include describing how the units/departments plan to expand opportunities to work with Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) or business clusters.

All Research England-funded HEIs are eligible to participate in bids.

A total of £75 million is available through the fund to be allocated to each successful unit/department over three years (AY 19/20, 20/21 and 21/22). There are no minimum or maximum threshold for awards. However, it is expected that a maximum of ten awards will be awarded.

Awards will be for the three year period.

The deadline for expressions of interest is 17 July 2018.

Shortlisted proposals will be notified in September/October 2018. The deadline for full bids will be in January 2019.
